Do Kings still rule?



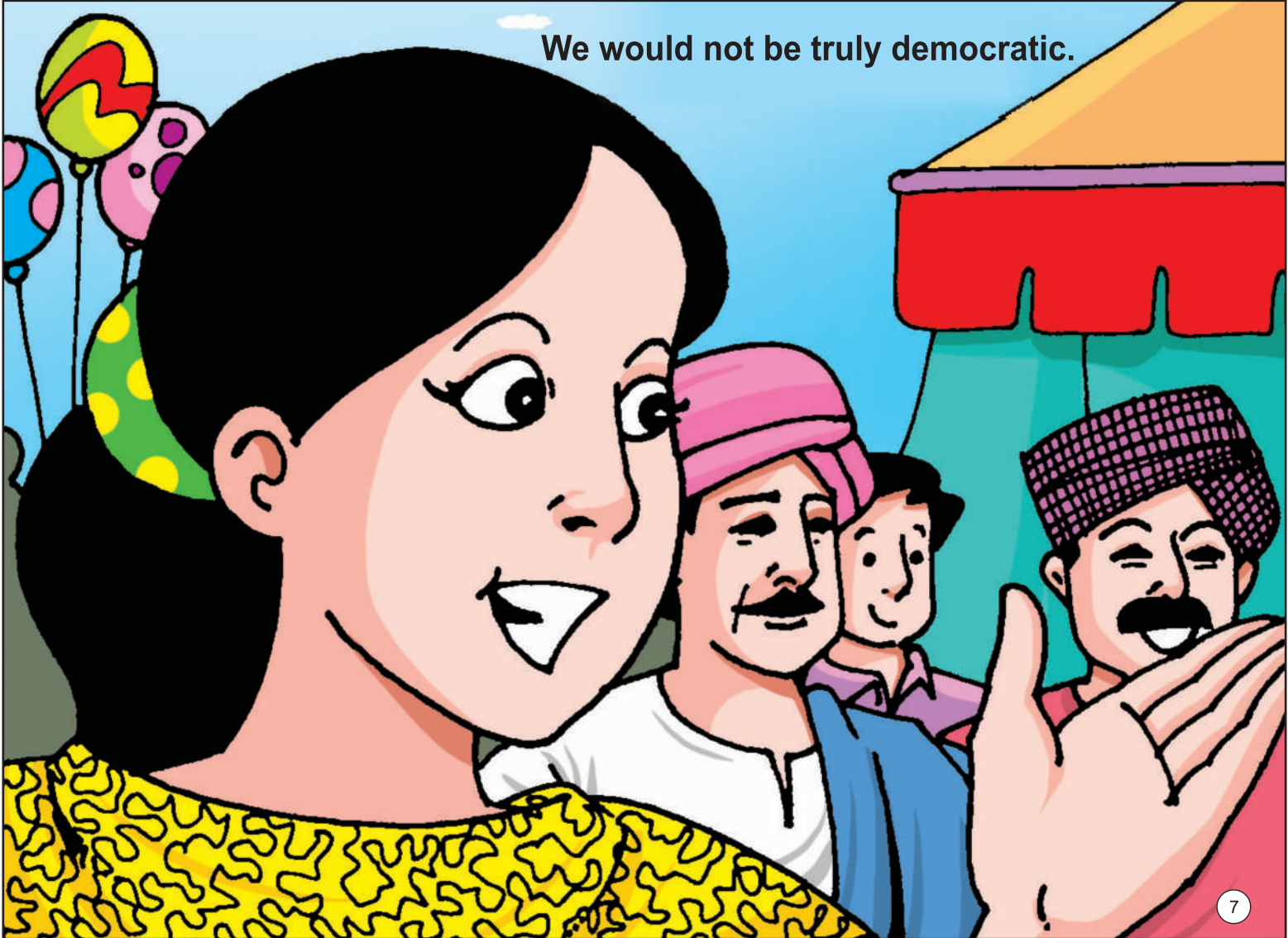

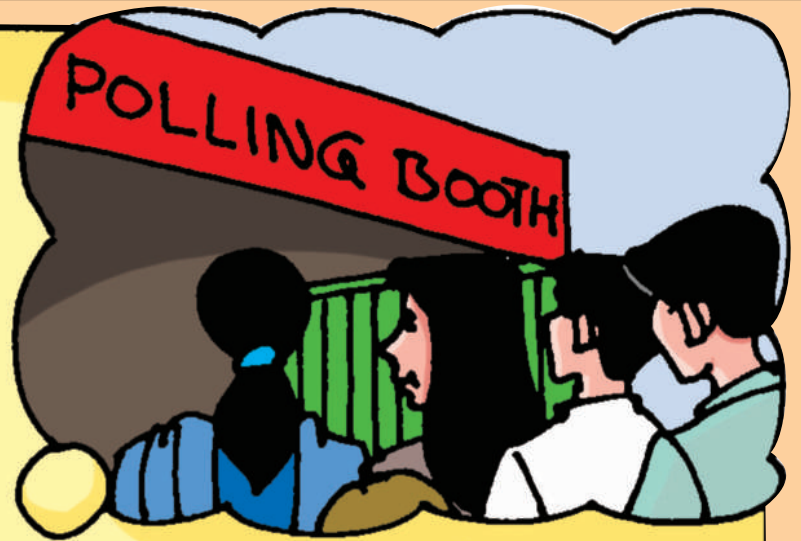

Why be a voter?




So that we choose our own representatives.

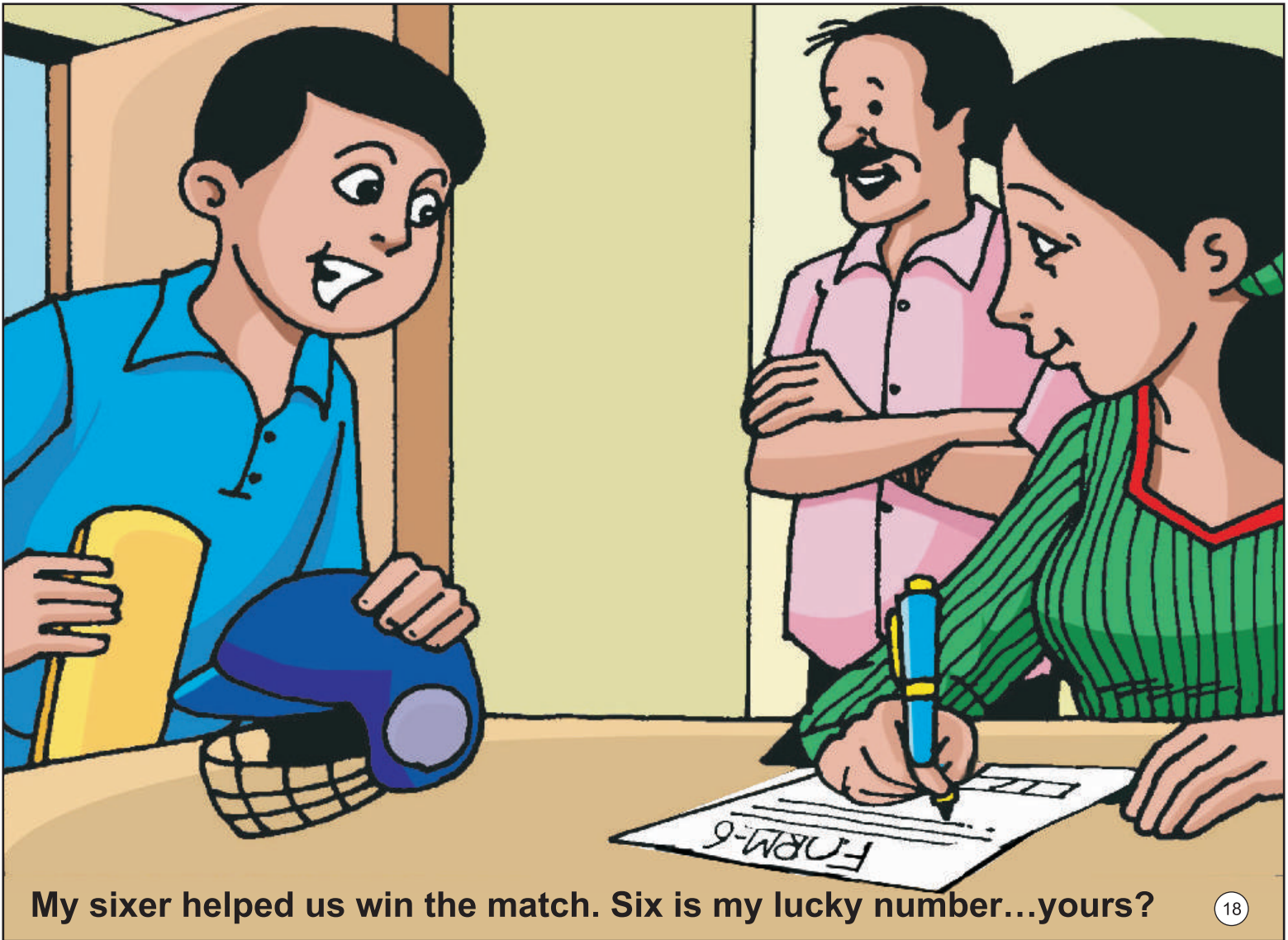

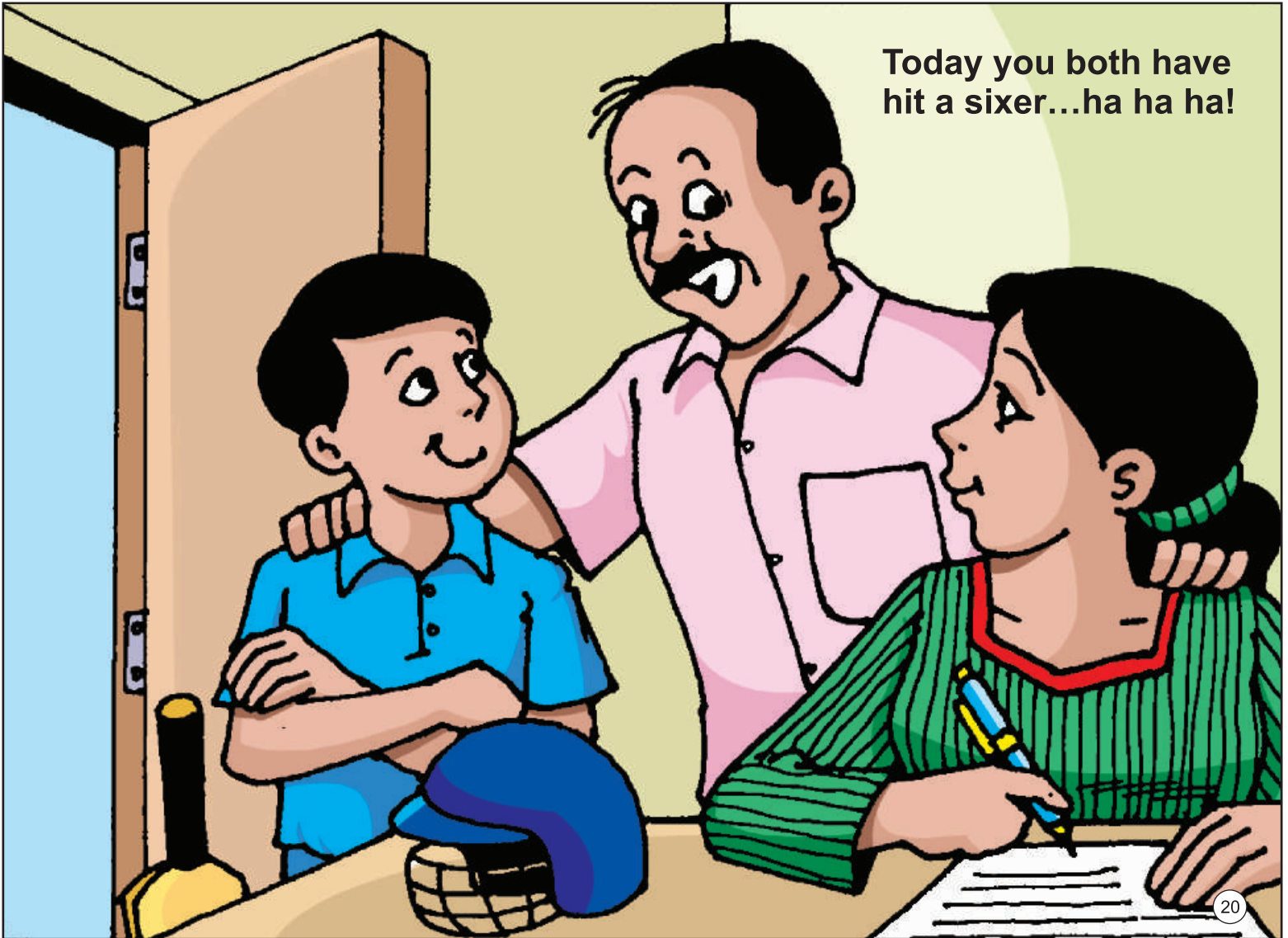


My sixer helped us win the match. Six is my lucky number...yours?

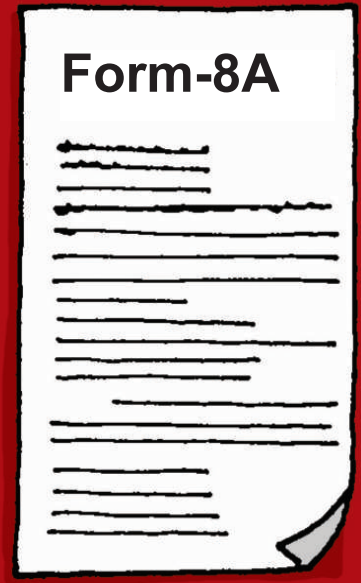

To correct your details for change in address within the same constituency



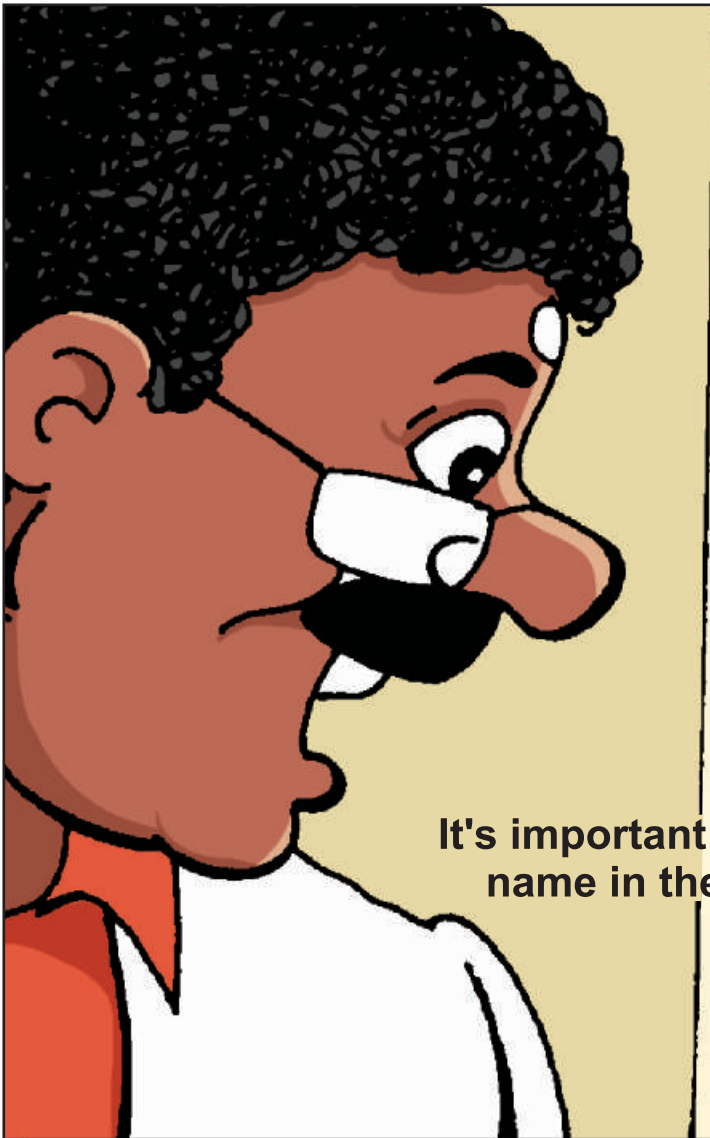
**SWAMI SIR'S

in the voters list earlier?

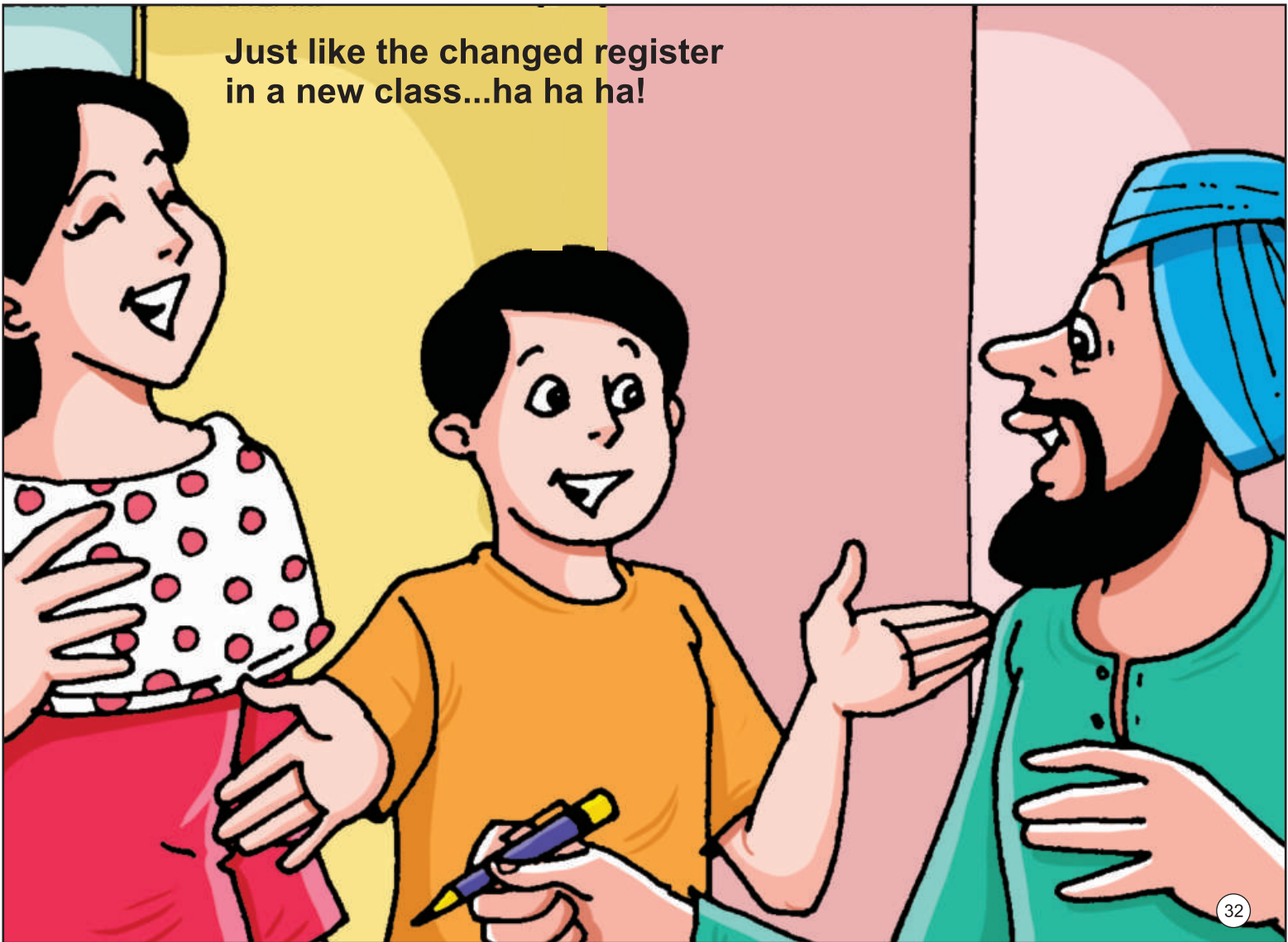


I was registered in Punjab but now I work in Uttar Pradesh.



So, I will get my name deleted in Amritsar and will register in Kanpur now.

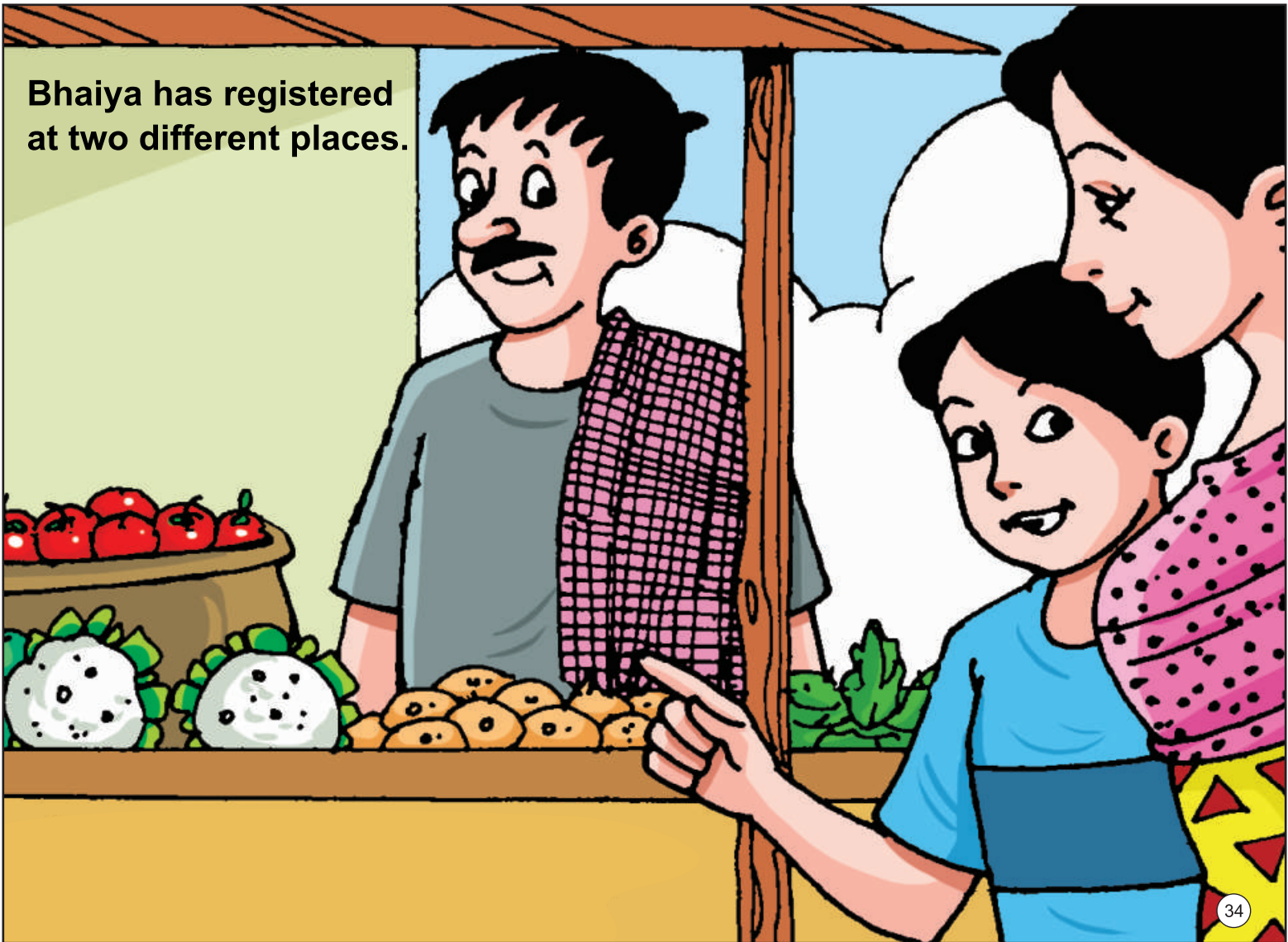
Just like the changed register
in a new class...ha ha ha!



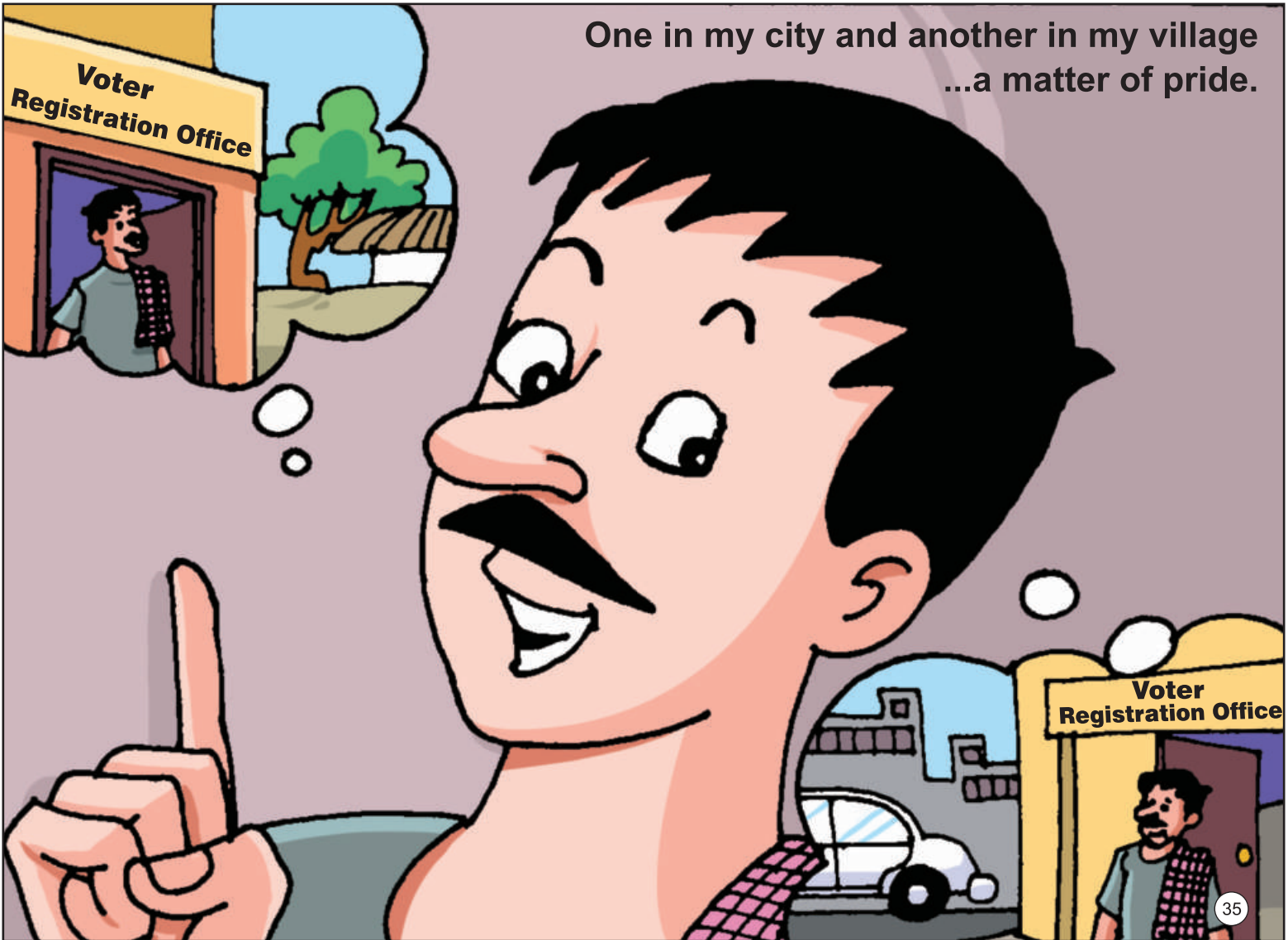


RIGHT IDENTITY

It is a matter of punishment. Registering in two places or more is an offence.



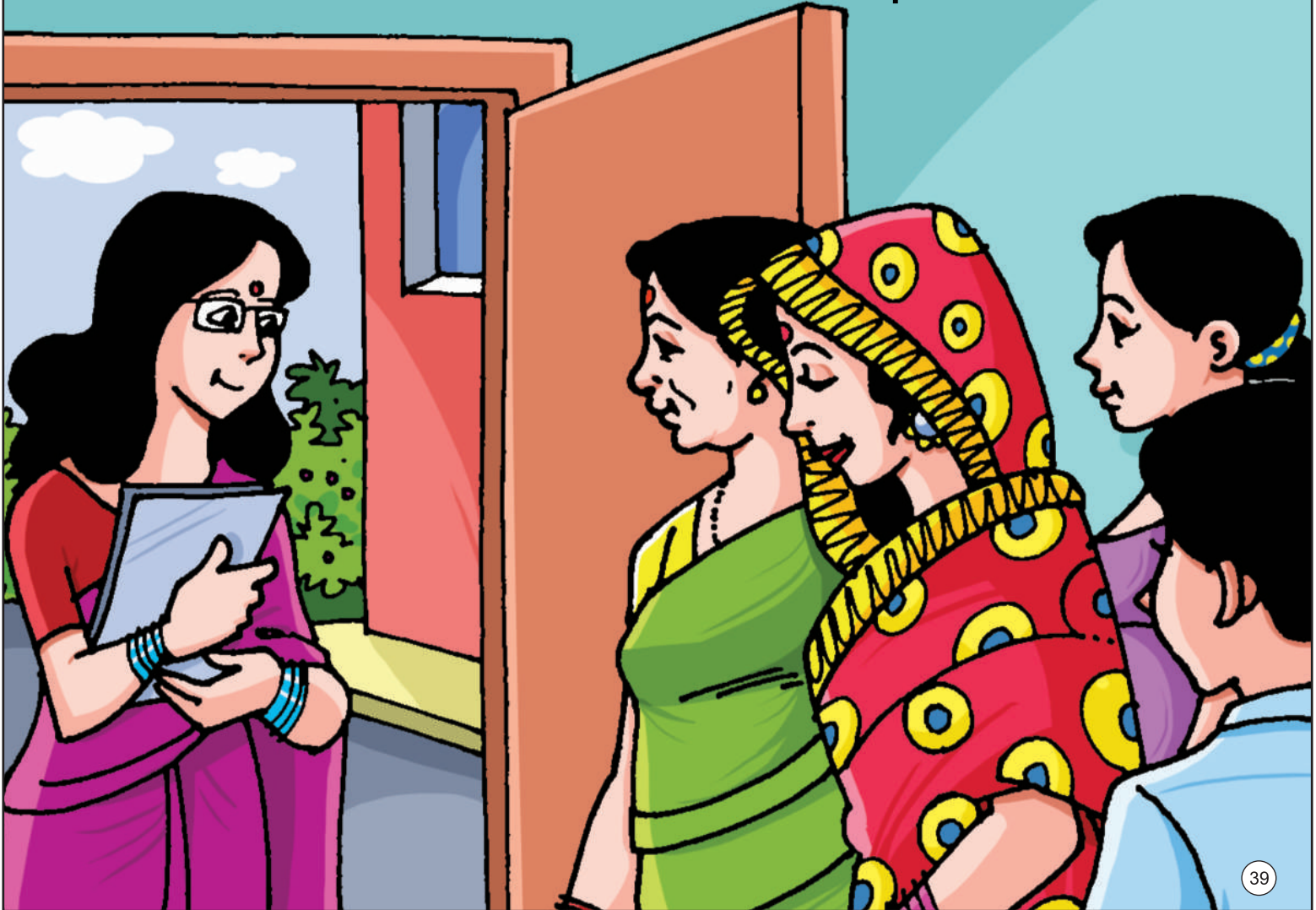

name there.



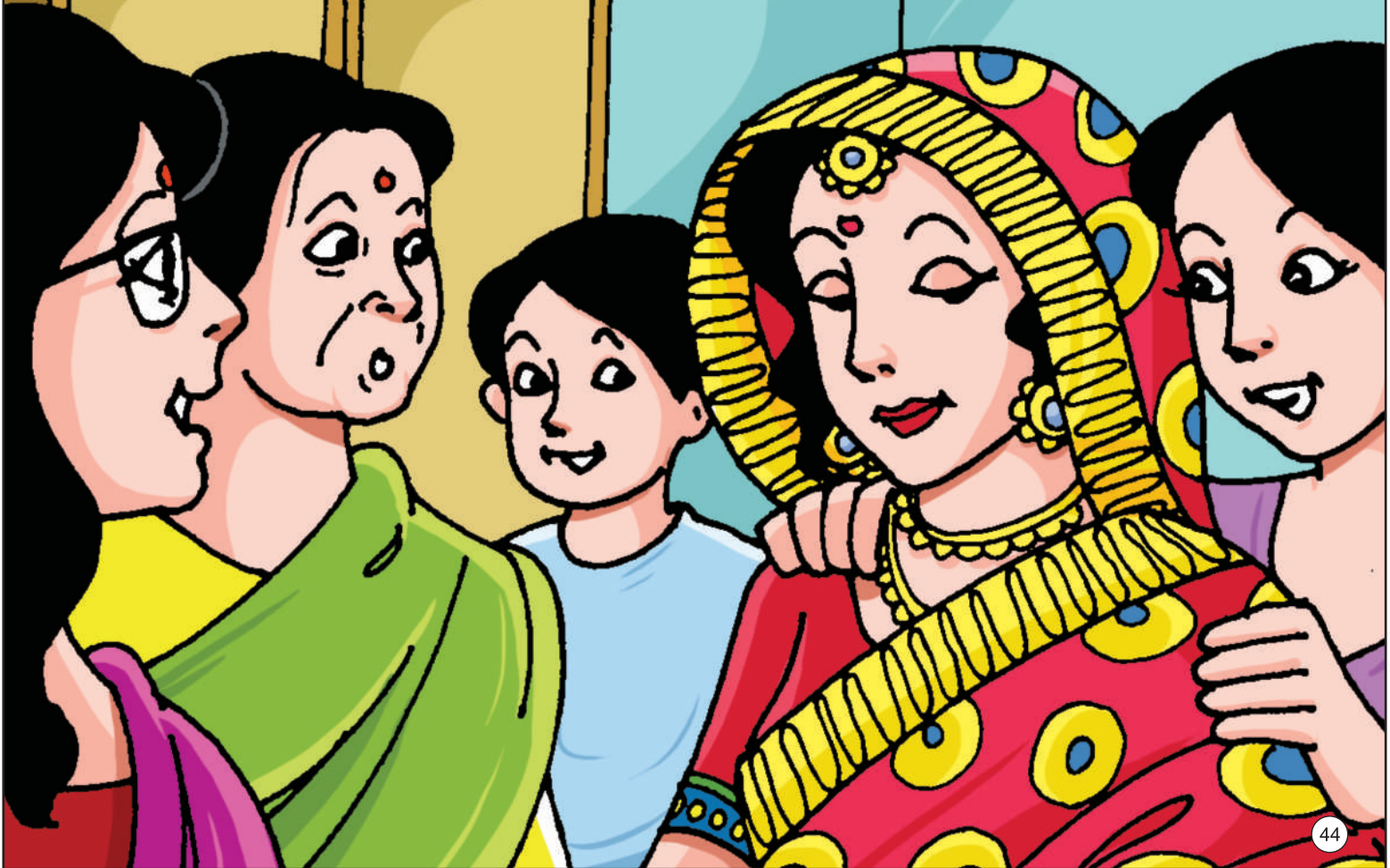
But, now she will live in her new home.
